## REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

#### FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2003

The Trustees present herewith their report along with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2003.

The Society registered as a charity on 25 April 1975 under registration number 266383.

The Society is affiliated to the Richard Wagner Verband, the International Organisation of Wagner Societies.

## Principal objectives

The principal objectives of the charity are as follows:-

- 1) To advance education in and appreciation of the life and work of Richard Wagner
- 2) To promote and organise public performances anywhere in the world of the works of Richard Wagner by the Society from time to time and for special purposes include in its programmes suitable works by other composers.
- To promote and organise other cultural and educational activities relevant to the study and appreciation of the music of Richard Wagner.

#### Policies adopted

To achieve the above policies the Society:-

- 1. Arranges meetings, events and study days to enable members to further their understanding and appreciation of the life and works of Richard Wagner. It also arranges events at which singers, directors, conductors etc. of Wagner productions talk about and discuss their work.
- 2. Publishes at regular intervals two magazines, Wagner and Wagner News, that are distributed free of charge to members.
- 3. Provides financial help to fund the coaching of young singers of Wagner and provides a bursary to enable a young singer to visit Bayreuth each August.
- In association with organisations such as The Mastersingers Company provides opportunities for young singers to perform Wagner in public and to take part in competitions.

#### Review of activities for the year 2003

The year 2003 was the fiftieth anniversary of the foundation of the present Wagner Society and to celebrate this occasion two special all-day events were mounted. The event held in May included a discussion on Wagner Today, a recital by John Tomlinson of music from the Ring, the Mastersingers Company competition for male Wagner singers and celebrity recitals. Our president, Dame Gwyneth Jones DBE, was present at the event held in December. She gave a Masterclass for recent winners of the Bayreuth Bursary competition, was interviewed by Sir John Tooley and gave a recital. Young artists performed staged extracts from Das Rheingold, Scenes 1 and 4 and there was a Mastersingers Company competition for female Wagner singers.

Four study days were held in 2003, two on Aspects of the Ring and two on Gotterdammerung. There was a meeting on Wagner's use of words in his operas and members also had the opportunity to attend two open rehearsals of Das Rheingold given by the Rehearsal orchestra and young singers.

The Bayreuth Bursary competition again attracted a good entry; the distinguished panel of judges chose the winner who was awarded a bursary to visit Bayreuth in August that included tickets to see the complete Ring Cycle at the Festspielhaus.

During 2003, Wagner (editor Roger Allen) was published twice and Wagner News (editor Ian Beresford Gleaves) six times.

Four young singers of Wagner were given financial help to pay for coaching and the Society also paid the expenses of a former Bursary winner to take part in two rounds of The International Singing Competition for Wagner Voices 2003 which was held in Bayreuth.

#### Financial review and investment policy

The principal source of income was from membership subscriptions received and by various donations and fundraising events undertaken by members. Members of the executive committee and others, including professionals, give their time voluntarily to the charity and often bear some of the incidental postage, stationery and travelling expenditure personally.

Income received is utilised against the principal objectives and the running costs of the charity.

Total income during the year amounted to £40,020. Direct charitable expenditure amounted to £56,659. To the deficit of £16,639 the charity's administration costs of £2,468 were deducted which leaves net outgoing resources for the year of £19,107.

The amount of £2,619 being a gain on investments held, was added to the funds leaving a deficit of £16,488 to be carried forward. Funds brought forward from previous years totalled £56,773. Therefore total funds carried forward at 31 December 2003 totalled £40,285.

Full details of the financial results of the year are shown in the statement of financial activities on page 7.

There are no restrictions on the charity's power to invest. The investment strategy is set by the trustees and unrestricted funds are invested in interest bearing 14 day notice account.

#### **Funds**

All funds are unrestricted.

#### Reserves policy

It is the policy of the charity to maintain funds at a level sufficient to finance not less than twelve months of unrestricted expenditure and that this level of reserves is held throughout the year.

All officers and members retire at the annual general meeting and in accordance with the constitution are eligible to stand for election at the forthcoming Annual General Meeting.

#### Risk management

The trustees actively review the major risks which the charity may face on a regular basis and believe that maintaining reserves at current levels, combined with an annual review of the controls over key financial systems, will provide sufficient resources in the event of adverse conditions. The trustees have also examined other operational and business risks faced by the charity and confirm that they have established systems to mitigate the significant risks.

## Equal opportunities policy

Membership of the committee is open to any person from any background who is able to contribute to the running of the organisation or any special project undertaken by the charity and to all lovers of Wagners Music.

No person is excluded from membership of the charity or the committee on the grounds of sex, race, colour, religion or disability.

#### Statement of trustees' responsibilities

The Trustees of the Wagner Society are required to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the movement of funds for that year. In preparing those financial statements, the trustees are required to:-

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and for safeguarding its assets.

#### **Independent examiner**

Lt. Col K.G. White retired as the independent examiner during the year and Mr S.G. Duker FCA was appointed in his stead. Mr S.G. Duker being eligible offers himself for re-election at the forthcoming annual general meeting.

I report on the accounts of The Wagner Society for the year ended 31 December 2003 which are set out on pages 7 to 11.

#### Respective responsibilities of trustees and the independent examiner

As described on page 5, you, the charity's trustees, are responsible for the preparation of the accounts; you consider that the audit requirement of section 43 (2) of the Charities Act 1993 (the Act) does not apply and that an independent examination is needed. #### **Basis of opinion**

## 1. Accounting policies

#### a) Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective March 2000). In preparing the financial statements the charity follows best practice as laid down in the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" (SORP 2000) issued in October 2000 and SORP Update Bulletin 1 issued in December 2002.

## b) Tangible fixed assets for use by the charity and depreciation

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rate in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life:-

#### e) Value added tax

Costs are inclusive of input value added tax not recoverable by the charity.
