STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing Document

The Society registered as a charity on 25 April 1975 under registration number 266383. The charity is governed by its constitution, which was adopted on 12 May 2014.

The Society is affiliated to the Richard Wagner Verband International, the International Association of Wagner Societies.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Principal objectives

The principal objectives of the charity are as follows:-

- 1. To advance education in and appreciation of the life and work of Richard Wagner.
- 2. To promote and organise public performances anywhere in the world of the works of Richard Wagner by the Society from time to time and for special purposes include in the Society's programmes suitable works by other composers.
- 3. To promote and organise other cultural and educational activities relevant to the study and appreciation of the music of Richard Wagner.

Activities

To achieve the above objectives the Society:-

- 1. Arranges meetings, events and study days to enable members to further their understanding and appreciation of the life and works of Richard Wagner. It also arranges events at which singers, directors, conductors etc. of Wagner productions talk about and discuss their work.
- 2. Publishes at regular intervals the magazine, Wagner News, which is distributed free of charge to members.
- 3. Provides financial help to fund the coaching of young singers of Wagner and provides a bursary to enable young musicians to visit Bayreuth each year for its Scholarship Programme ("Stipendienstiftung").
- 4. Provides opportunities for young singers to perform Wagner in public and to take part in competitions.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Chairman's Report (Richard Miles)

By the standards of the five years of my chairmanship, 2017 was relatively uneventful. It has also been more fun than ever. This is a tribute to everyone who is or has served on the Committee over the past year, and especially to Neil King, for his hospitality both at Committee meetings and at the unforgettable Christmas party. We ought perhaps to be too serious-minded to consider such things, but enjoying ourselves and each other's company, whether on the Committee or as members, is the glue that holds a voluntary organisation together. The Christmas party was a perfect example of this (as far as I can remember..).

Membership numbers continue to grow (up from 922 to 1,002), and therefore our finances are healthy, giving us the flexibility to increase our support for Wagner-related causes and projects.

We aim for our own Events programme to be roughly self-financing, and ticket prices are set accordingly. We do not seek to make a profit overall, but some events – including the Singing Competition – inevitably cost more to stage than others, while some make a small profit, depending on the number of tickets sold. On that point, we would encourage more members to attend our events: they are interesting, varied, entertaining, instructive – and unique; for me at least, the best reason to join the Society. Over the years, I have been able to broaden my understanding of Wagner and gain insight into his works from a wide variety of performers, directors, historians, academics and others; and I would encourage others to benefit as well. We are trying to make our events more 'topical' & aligned with current Wagner productions at the Royal Opera House and elsewhere. This year: Lohengrin and The Ring at Covent Garden, and The Flying Dutchman at Longborough.

Having the imagination and contacts to come up with ideas for events is a responsibility shared across the Committee, but the time and commitment required to actually arrange them makes the role of Events Manager one of the most demanding on the Committee. Jan Leigh, together with Helen Beardsley for the last, very successful Singing Competition, have done a tremendous job over the last few years, and Henry Kennedy is now stepping into this role, fizzing with ideas and energy.

On the Committee we now have several years' continuity at Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer level, which provides stability. With all due modesty, and pointing at the Treasurer and Secretary who do most of the work, I would suggest that this is a great strength of the Society. Rotation, and introducing new blood, is also a good thing: however, the speed of rotation can be a little excessive at times (we aim at an RPM akin to the turning of the celestial spheres). The underlying problem is that it remains difficult to find younger members able to fit the demands of Committee meetings in with work, study and personal commitments. Katie Clay took over as editor of Wagner News in the summer and produced one of the best editions ever, but regretfully handed over to Alan Ridgewell after two editions. We congratulate her on her recent engagement: it was a heroic effort to combine planning a wedding; a full-time career and editing a 90-page magazine. We were lucky to have her for even two editions: the stylistic innovations and enhanced 'look' of the magazine that she introduced will remain, and we are extremely grateful to her.

Apart from Henry and Alan, already mentioned, we welcomed Meli Haltzihrysidis on to the Committee during the year. He is already contributing ideas on how we market ourselves and find new members. We are more than ever convinced that increasing & broadening our membership is the one of the keys to everything we do.

Finally, the second key: encouraging existing members to play a more active part. We welcome ideas, offers of help, new Committee members, contributions to Wagner news...it's a cliche to point out that the Society belongs to its members, but it's true, and the Committee would really appreciate a much more interaction with, and help from, the membership. As mentioned at the start, it can be fun as well as rewarding.

Review of activities for the year 2017

The year began in the usual way with the Joint Music Societies' Dinner when the Alkan, Liszt, Mahler Schubert and Wagner Societies joined forces for a dinner and recital at The Forge in Camden Town. Each society presented a short programme of works by their composer, which was followed by dinner. For many, the chief memory, aside from the lovely music, was the extreme cold of the venue!

Wagner Society events proper began in February at the German Historical Institute with an illustrated talk by Jonathan Haswell entitled *From Stage to Screen: Filming Opera*. Jonathan Haswell is one of this country's leading directors of opera for the television and cinema screenings and, among many other assignments, he has for the last thirteen years directed the cameras for the Royal Opera House, where his work includes the most recent productions of the Ring and of Parsifal. Members enjoyed scenes from these and other operas in a talk covering the process and aesthetics of transferring a stage performance to the screen.

A second event in February was Paul Dawson-Bowling's study day on Die Meistersinger von Nürnberg entitled: The wisdom of Die Meistersinger; its ideas for a better world and their relevance for our troubled times. This day was arranged to coincide with the new production of Die Meistersinger at Covent Garden and was designed to give newcomers a good introduction to the work as well as providing some new thoughts for experienced members.

In March, we revived the tradition of an annual dinner for the society and fifty-five members came to the Royal Over-Seas League for a reception, four course meal and a short after-dinner recital by Samantha Crawford. The evening culminated in Paul Dawson-Bowling giving a short tribute before presenting Anthony Negus with the Goodall Award for 2017 in recognition, primarily, of his Wagner work at the Longborough Festival Opera. Anthony Negus responded with evocative memories of his career; he was subsequently made an honorary member of the Wagner Society and the dinner will now become an annual event.

Beethoven was a great influence on Wagner and this was the subject of the April talk by Mark Austin, a conductor and musical scholar, which considered musical and written documents that permit a deeper understanding of both figures. He was joined by soprano Mari Wyn Williams (a 2016 Wagner Society Singing Competition finalist) who sang musical extracts as part of the lecture.

The best attended event of the year came in May when the Goodall Award winner, Anthony Negus, returned with Carmen Jakobi to give a joint talk about Tristan und Isolde of which, at Longborough, they were, respectively, conductor and director. The talk covered the process by which singers learn and understand their roles as well as a discussion of the often-cut section of Act II. A very memorable evening.

Two days after June's AGM came the annual Masterclass for two finalists of the previous year's Singing Competition given by the society's President, Dame Gwyneth Jones. She coached Samantha Crawford and Mari Wyn Williams during the evening in Elsa's Dream: "Einsam in trüben Tagen" from Lohengrin. This was followed by a short reception for members.

Following an extended break for the summer, our two Bayreuth Bursary winners (Samantha Crawford, soprano, and Henry Kennedy, conductor) came to St Botolph's Hall in October to reminisce on their experiences in Bayreuth in the summer. Samantha also performed a short Wagner programme accompanied by Kelvin Lim. Cormac Cawley, Secretary, introduced the evening and gave a short history of the bursary scheme.

The final event of the year, once again hosted by Neil King, the society's Treasurer, at his house in Islington, was our very enjoyable Christmas Party. The event was sold out and members lucky enough to attend began with Champagne followed by a hot buffet supper. The advertised 9pm finishing time of this event was widely disregarded as members caught up with each other at this purely social function.

Wagner Society's Singing Competition 2017

The Wagner Society's annual Singing Competition is the highlight of our calendar and this year attracted the highest member attendance of recent years, perhaps drawn by the high profile panel of judges: -

Dame Janet Baker Martin Brabbins (Musical Director of the English National Opera) Dame Gwyneth Jones (Chairman of Judges) Peter Katona (Director of Casting, Royal Opera House) Dame Felicity Lott

From a very wide field of applicants, eight finalists were selected following a preliminary round of auditions and they were invited, for the first time this year, to sing both works by Wagner and a work by another composer. This produced a very varied programme of music during the afternoon and with less repetitions of well-known arias than in the past.

The judges retired to consider their verdicts on the finalists and eventually arrived at their decision and, as Dame Janet pointed out, "we have all remained friends".

 MICHELLE ALEXANDER, soprano
- President's Master Class Award (A masterclass with Dame Gwyneth Jones)

A number of changes have been made to the membership structure by the committee during 2017 and numbers for 2016 have been restated on a basis consistent with the new arrangements to allow for a fair comparison:

- Honorary members have been listed within the main membership numbers for the first time; such
 members enjoy all the rights and privileges of other members and the society includes these
 members in its annual return to the RWVI and the levy payable to that organization also includes
 these members. It is therefore appropriate that they are shown as part of our overall membership
 numbers. Five new honorary members were appointed during the year (in alphabetical order):
 Dame Janet Baker, Martyn Brabbins, Catherine Foster, Dame Felicity Lott, and Anthony Negus.
- Institutional members (mainly music colleges and libraries) have hitherto been shown within the individual category, which is clearly misleading. These are now shown separately and the total for individual members in 2016 has been consequently adjusted. The Legal Deposit Libraries are not included in this total.
- Following the success of our policy of admitting students to membership without the payment of a subscription, we have extended this to include all young people under 30 and have thus increased our membership in these two categories by 44 members.
- We have also instituted a new membership category for 'Alumni' members. It is intended that this category should include winners of and participants in the annual Singing Competition, winners of the Bayreuth Bursary and other people whom the society has helped with grants or coaching over the years. No subscription is required from alumni members who also enjoy all the rights and privileges of other members.

These changes, as well as advertising and general interest in the society, have resulted in a net increase in members of 80 during the year.

Joint membership is available for two individuals living at the same address but sharing mailings, in particular, only receiving one copy of *Wagner News*. The number of 340 joint members shown above therefore represents 170 joint membership subscriptions received.

The committee thanks both the editors who served during the year for their hard work and dedication in ensuring that the high standards of *Wagner News* are maintained and congratulates Alan Ridgewell on his appointment as editor of *Wagner News* from January 2018. All recent and almost all earlier editions of *Wagner News* are now available to all members on the website.

Financial review and investment policy

The principal sources of income were membership subscriptions received, donations, and sale of tickets for events. Members of the Committee and others, including professionals, give their time voluntarily to the charity and often bear some of the incidental postage, stationery and travelling expenditure personally. No member of the Committee received any remuneration in respect of their duties (2016: £nil).

Income received is spent on the principal objectives and the running costs of the charity; total income during the year amounted to £62,603 and direct charitable expenditure amounted to £55,303. From the surplus of £7,240, the charity's support costs of £1,903 and depreciation of £91 are deducted, leaving net incoming resources for the year of £5,246. The amount of £3,824, being an unrealised gain on investments held, is added to this surplus giving a final net surplus of £9,070 to be carried forward. Funds brought forward from previous years totalled £65,227 and therefore total funds carried forward at 31 December 2017 are £74,297.

There are no restrictions on the charity's power to invest.

Full details of the financial results of the year are shown in the statement of financial activities on page 11 and the relevant notes on pages 13 - 17.

Reserves policy

It is the policy of the charity to maintain funds at a level sufficient to finance all future planned activities.

Risk management

The trustees actively review the major risks which the charity may face on a regular basis and believe that maintaining reserves at current levels, combined with regular reviews of the controls over key financial systems, will provide sufficient resources to cover future commitments as well as headroom for unforeseeable events. The trustees have also examined other operational and business risks faced by the charity and confirm that they have established systems to mitigate the significant risks.

Statement of Trustees' responsibilities

The Trustees of the Wagner Society are required to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the movement of funds for that year. In preparing those financial statements, the trustees are required to:-

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and for safeguarding its assets. The trustees have had regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission on Public Benefit and we are within this guidance by virtue of our advancement of Richard Wagner and activities.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2017

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in compliance with the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing accounts, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102 1A) and the Charities Act 2011.

Incoming resources

Voluntary income

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. Members' subscriptions are spread over the period of their membership, which could straddle two financial years; donations and gifts are accounted for when they are received.

Income tax recoverable on members' subscriptions and donations is recognised only when a valid Gift Aid return is completed and submitted to HMRC.

Legacies are accounted for as soon as the Committee is notified of the amount of any bequest.

Income from investments

Dividends and interest are accounted for when receivable. Tax recoverable, if any, on such income is recognised in the same accounting year.

Gains and losses on investments

Realised gains or losses are recognized when investments are sold. Unrealised gains or losses are accounted for on revaluation of investments at 31 December each year.

Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets for use by the charity are stated at cost less depreciation.

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rate in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life:-

Equipment

33% on cost

Stock

Stock comprises opera tickets for resale, stationery and postage stamps. Stock is valued at face value or cost.

Value added tax

Costs are inclusive of input value added tax, which is not recoverable by the charity.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities and is not registered for VAT.

Fund accounting

Funds held by the charity are either:-

Unrestricted funds - these are funds which can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds - these are funds that can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Currently the charity has no restricted funds.
